Quentin, a young student of the Xavier Institute, was recently killed physically but lived on as a disembodied mind in a test tube. Now he too has suddenly returned to the world of the living to claim somebody he loves—a young woman named SOPHIE, one of the identical telepathic quintuplets calling themselves the STEPFORD CUCKOOS.

But Sophie, too, is dead. Quentin attempts to restore her to life with the aid of the Phoenix Force, Jean, under the control of the Phoenix Force, has taken WOLVERINE to the Arctic North and used him to weaken Jean's body so it could fully take over. When the X-Men arrive on the scene. Phoenix demands Cyclops to replenish her power with his eye-beams. Can he resist the most powerful force in the universe?



































































































Dear Marvel.
